Preparing Dishes of Hope ... Seasoned With Your Love

In Saida, Lebanon, the economy is shattered. This makes daily life challenging for everyone — especially the thousands of Syrian refugees who fled their homeland to find peace there.

Life is even harder for women, who aren't granted equal opportunity to pursue higher education, fulfilling work outside of the home or financial independence.

That is the case for Amal al Hilabi. As a Lebanese woman, her resources are limited. Yet she felt a calling to help women refugees.

Amal overcame the odds and created a new culinary business with a powerful mission statement, "Anyone who wants to have a job can come work here."

Her business plan is rooted in love and brings eight women refugees together to cook ready-toeat traditional Lebanese dishes, like stuffed grape leaves and kibbeh, to sell in local supermarkets.

While the food is delicious and the all-female team enjoys coming together to cook and create, Amal believes something other than food united them.

"It wasn't food — humanity brought us together," she says. "... some people came

here with nothing, but I have a love of giving, and I wanted them to have a source of income."

Amal could have generated a decent income for herself by limiting staff and



Your Kindness Uplifts Women Recovering From Trauma

In the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), rape is an epidemic. This horrific gender-based crime leaves behind life-altering trauma.

Mawazo Bieteko, who resides in Goma, a city in the eastern DRC, is a survivor of this type of gender-based violence. **After she was attacked, she felt lost, ashamed and alone.**

Fortunately, thanks to your love and support, Mawazo was able to find peace and take steps to rebuild her life after trauma through the **Tushinde Ujeuri Project** — as have thousands of other survivors.

The project works in an integrated manner to demonstrate greater acceptance of positive gender roles, improve the availability of community-level GBV-related services and reduce the perceptions of stigma surrounding reintegrated survivors.

Women like Mawazo can partake in community-based trauma-healing services and literacy programs to prepare them to re-enter their communities. They emerge empowered and equipped.


To date, your support has reached over 23,000 survivors who have benefited from this strengthening and healing initiative. Thank you. ■
